I think it was the most perfect match I ever saw. The lifting was beautiful. A summary of the lifts are as follows:- Two hands clean and jerk Gauss, 230 pounds - Mitchell 260, pounds. Two hands snatch Gauss, 180 pounds - Mitchell 190 pounds. Military Press Gauss 170 pounds - Mitchell 170 pounds. The totals were Mitchell, 620 pounds, and Gauss, 590 pounds.

I had Tromp Van Digglen, staying with me a few weeks ago, before he returned back to England, and then to South Africa.



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I might say that I attended the National A.A.U. convention in Baltimore, last week, where we shoved over weight lifting a little better. These are about the principle things that have happened of late. I might say the A.C.W.L.A. is not going ahead the way it should go.

You might be interested to know, that we have added quite a few fellows to our staff, with whom you are familiar - Mark Berry, who has charge of the Art Department, and working with him is Jack Russell, and recently we added George Dembinski, to our staff. Another young fellow who you met when you were down, Roy Smith, a light weight wrestler who works in a sporting goods business joined up with us today. Our business is growing very fast, but Charles MacMahon, is going more into a sporting goods business, as his course was not very successful.

I saw Earl a few weeks ago and we went out together. He talked quite a lot of you and I only wish you had been with us to make up a little gathering like we had a year ago last June.
