Dear Pal.

I have just received a long two or from Mr Bernard, which explains to us just now our asso: stands, & because of this it means that we have to do some reconstruction.

I am bitterly dissappointed to see how small the list is, after all the work I have done, & the one reason I wish you to Sec: also, is because it will save me much expense. You know all inquires must send postage, & 25 cts for other information. You know that American postage stamps are no good here, & that is my expense. When they write you, you will receive the postage, & they who send none, you do not have to answer.

The mass of correspondence is past, as I canvassed all on my list, frequently, they who wish to join new, must send in subs only, & you keep out \$1.50 & send the other \$1.50 to the editor for mag:

I have done a lot & hate to see it go flop, the I beleive Bernards inactivity has hurt us. I beleive Gay will shoot in a few members, & he cannot but any thing acrosse us. If this fails, them, what we will do, is fust this. We will write Calvert, & sa say that Bernard has dropped it, & ask him if they will go ahead with it, as he is always writing me of his pupils & readers wanting an asso: . & they may redeem it. Tho I beleive we should give it a try first, & use up the money in an honest endeavour to save the cause. Another plan we might take, is this. Suppossing it fails. We can write Calvert & if he does not want to handle it, we can say, here. As H & L has dropped is, we have deducted the \$1.50 mag: fee off, & are accepting members at \$1.50, & the asso: is run free of any mag: . & we would appreciate it if he would be an honory member. & give it publicity in his mag:, & amongst his pupils. If not we will have to drop it, but I beleive for the future that we are locking at, that it behoves us to give it a try, & if we run a course, we can resign. & see other good mena re put in our place. Bernard seems to be wrant up in his mag: which I do not blame him, as it is his living, to bother with us, so we must look after ourselves. Another thing I have in mind, is this, why I wish to see the asso: last a little longer. You & I can make records & receive the official recognition before it would close, presuming it did, & as diploma holders for records, it is very influential for our prestige. Bernard will give all the publicity we wish for any records ctc. Now I hope you will accept the Sec: Treas: of it, as it will release me for other vital work it. the asses answering questions, & arranging rules for records, & canvassing prospective members. I hope that you have gone into the letters thoroughly I sent you, & I will tell you Ottley, if you are more bound up in the course than in booklets. I am with you, & we will prepare our propoganda, & ads, & exercises, & personal appeals. Then we will be all ready for the time when when ready As I said in my last letter, it will be much better if we can be together. So much time is saved. & we are there to snap up any prespective exhibitions that will show up. In my letter to-day, I pointed cut, that this would kurt us, as many will say, "Why should we pay out \$3.00 to join an asso: & have cur efforts recognised, when we can pay just 50 cts to "H & &", same as we would have to pay the asso:, & get just as much official recognition."

I said this was taking things out of our hands, & if it was not it would not help him, as members would prefer asso: records.

I think he sees an opportunity of a few spare dollars, & now he has broke with us officially, he can make it at our expense.

Of course if we had to quit the asso: it would be alright for us all, & I therefore asked him if he would hold it up a while to see what conclusions we could come to.

If we decide to go ahead, we cannot stand for it, & if we quit, we can encourage him to go ahead.
